Data Across Sectors for Health presents a three-part webinar series: Advancing Community Health Through Equitable Data Ecosystems. *Part I: Building Foundation with Community* June 7, 2022, 12:00 p.m. – 1:00 p.m. CT

Data Across Sectors for Health (DASH) is pleased to present the first installment of a three-part webinar series: *Advancing Community Health Through Equitable Data Ecosystems*. The webinar series introduces the DASH Framework, which highlights the key domains of shared multi-sector data landscapes and will help to guide communities to leverage their data ecosystem for equitable systems change.

This first session will focus on Building Foundation with Community. Panelists from DASH-funded communities will discuss the challenges and complexities involved in relationship-building, and opportunities for establishing relationships among partners within the community.

The panelists will discuss the challenges and complexities involved in relationship-building, along with the opportunities of establishing relationships among partners within the community. They will also address what is involved in successfully managing multiple partnerships, such as transparency, collaborative governance, and balancing power dynamics.

By the end of the session, attendees will be able to:

- 1. Identify the power dynamics influencing individual and group interactions and communication in their local communities.
- 2. Understand trust-building and partnership formation as interrelated core principles and activities of successful multi-sector data sharing initiatives advancing health equity.
- 3. Describe how building a shared vision forms the foundation that is necessary for multi-sector data sharing collaborations to advance equity.

Elisa Orona, Executive Director of the Health Improvement Partnership (HIP) of Santa Cruz (CIC-START, 2019)

Elisa Orona has worked across multiple sectors, including non-profit healthcare, local government, and the arts, with a focus on community empowerment and collaboration. Since 2015, Elisa has lead HIP as its Executive Director. Elisa began her career in healthcare at a San Jose-based Federally Qualified Health Center where she managed clinic quality improvement, as well as a federally funded Patient Navigation Center. Prior to her jump to healthcare, Elisa worked on behalf of the City of San Jose to catalyze a struggling cultural center into a thriving multicultural arts education non-profit. Elisa holds a B.A. in Rhetoric from UC Berkeley and an M.S. in Public Policy and Management from Carnegie Mellon University in Pittsburgh, PA. Elisa's masters concentration in Geographic Information Systems served her well in Peace Corps Guatemala, where she trained fellow volunteers and their Guatemalan counterparts in the creation and analysis of digital maps.

Elisa serves on the boards of FoodWhat?!, Ventures, Santa Cruz Health Information Organization, Housing Santa Cruz County and Dignity Health Dominican Hospital Community Board. In 2019, Elisa was appointed to the Santa Cruz County Workforce Development Board.

She has 15 years of experience working in collaborative settings across sectors, including; business cooperatives, non-profit, public health, the service industry and corporate social impact. Eva holds a BA in Political Geography from UC Berkeley and MA in International Management from ISCTE Lisbon, Portugal. She is mother to two young boys and a bi-cultural latina whose favorite self-care pastimes are jumping in the ocean and foraging flower arrangements from her small garden.

Ivette Guillermo-McGahee, Founder and Executive Director with Allies in Caring (ABCD Cohort, 2022)

Ivette Guillermo-McGahee is the founder and CEO of Allies In Caring, a Hammonton, New Jersey nonprofit offering a continuum of behavioral health services. These include in-home treatment for families experiencing crisis, outpatient services for individuals diagnosed with a behavioral health disorder, and respite services for caregivers. AIC's runs the "ConVivir Wellness Hub," which offers community programs in the areas of promotion and prevention. Promotion builds skills to enhance the ability of immigrants and the disabled to withstand challenges. Prevention works with children and parents exposed to traumatic experiences or who have other risks associated with the onset of behavioral health disorders before a crisis.

Providing access to social and economic opportunities, promoting health, and establishing community resources and collaborations have been a part of Ivette's recent work. Ivette provides leadership to the Hammonton Health Coalition and the Coalition for Deaf and Hard of

Hearing in South Jersey. She seeks to address the social determinants of health and to mitigate the impact of adverse childhood experiences. Her work in this area has been recognized by state and national entities. Persistent racial and ethnic disparities in healthcare constitute major clinical, public health, and societal problems. Ivette founded Allies In Caring, Inc., to provide leadership, advocacy, and excellence in promoting culturally-responsive, mental health services for diverse populations.

Ivette serves as key contributor in developing the capacity to improve access to resources and opportunities to underserved populations in NJ. She has worked with the NJ Public Health Institute assisting with pandemic recovery efforts, improving public health infrastructure, and addressing the inequities in the state's health system. She is a design team member of the Gathering Ground/Creative NJ program, Elevating Equity, the goal of which is find alternatives to disrupt inequities in the nonprofit sector and to build alternatives. Ivette was recently appointed to the prestigious Robert Wood Johnson Foundation's Jegna Council, which advises their grantmaking team in addressing disparities in health equity in NJ.

Ivette is a Licensed Professional Counselor and an Approved Clinical Supervisor (ACS). Her professional training includes a Master in Mental Health Counseling from Gallaudet University, D.C. Her post-graduate training includes Multicultural Therapy, Systems Centered Therapy (SCT), Trauma Focus – CBT, and Mindfulness Based Interventions. She studies and practices Theory U and Social Presenting Theater.

lvette's experience as a Mexican-born child of Deaf parents underlies her profound understanding of the potential for growth that lies within the hardships that are a part of the human experience. Her vision is to help families work through adversity in a way that enables them to thrive and develop into more skillful, mindful, and compassionate human beings.

Waldo Mikels-Carrasco is the Director of the Center for Health Information Sharing & Innovation at the Illinois Public Health Institute, where he serves as the Co-Director of Data Across Sectors for Health (DASH). He is the former Director of Community & Governmental Solutions at the Indiana Health Information Exchange (IHIE) where he was responsible for collaborative organizational development focusing on multi-sector data-sharing efforts to address social determinants of health (SDoH). His work at IHIE included developing partnerships to improve Transitions-in-Care for populations experiencing prison and jail reentry, homelessness/housing insecurity, HIV/AIDS, substance use disorder, and the need for Long-Term Social Services. Prior to joining the health information sector, he spent several years at the University of Notre Dame, where he served as the Community Health Research Program Manager at the Interdisciplinary

Center for Network Science & Applications (iCeNSA), and as the regional liaison for the Indiana Clinical and Translational Sciences Institute's (ICTSI) Community Health Engagement Program (CHEP).

Outside of the academy, Waldo was an inaugural member of the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services Office of Minority Health's Regional Health Equity Council for Region V, as part of National Partnership for Action to End Health Disparities. As an applied researcher, he has served as Principal Investigator on multiple projects addressing health disparities, infant mortality, mental health, and childhood obesity. He holds a MA in applied medical anthropology from the University of North Texas and BA in philosophy from Indiana University.
